A Message from our Executive Secretary, Brad Bushman



Dear friends and colleagues,

I am still loving my job as the Executive Secretary for the International Society for Research on Aggression (ISRA)! I look forward to serving in this capacity until 2026. I have been an active member of ISRA since 1984, when I first started doing aggression research as an undergraduate student. It is hard to believe that I have been a member of ISRA for nearly 40 years!

ISRA now has 305 active members from 31 different countries, and the numbers grow nearly every week. It is exciting that 125 of our members (41%) are students, which bodes well for our future.

Recall that we instituted for the very first time the L. Rowell Huesmann Early Career Award. I am happy to report that we received seven excellent nominations for the award. As noted in the ISRA Bylaws, the winner was selected by the Officers and Council Members, who were told: “If you have a conflict of interest with any nominee (e.g., you have published with them before), please exclude that nominee from your evaluations.” I am happy to announce that the winner was Spencer Evans. Here is a brief bio about Dr. Evans:

Dr. Spencer Evans is an Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Miami, where he is affiliated with the Clinical Program and Child Division. Dr. Evans earned his Ph.D. in Clinical Child Psychology, with a minor in quantitative methods, from the University of Kansas in 2017. He subsequently completed a post-doctoral research fellowship focusing on youth mental health treatment and assessment at Harvard University. Broadly, Dr. Evans’s research focuses on behavioral and emotional dysregulation problems in youth, with three particular lines of interest: (1) the developmental course, correlates, and outcomes of irritability and aggression in children and adolescents; (2) assessment, diagnosis, and classification of youth psychopathology; and (3) evidence-based psychosocial intervention. To date, he has published more than 65 peer-reviewed publications related to these topics. His research has attracted funding and recognitions from the National Institute of Mental Health, the American Psychological Foundation, AIM Youth Mental Health, the Association for Psychological Science, and the *Journal of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology*. In addition, Dr. Evans has been actively involved in ICD-11 and DSM-5 revision efforts, with a particular focus on the diagnostic classification of problems related to irritability, aggression, and disruptive behavior across development.

Dr. Evans will be one of the speakers at the **ISRA Biennial World Meeting in Munich, Germany** (July 29 to August 2, 2024). The working title of his talk is: “Youth Irritability, Anger, and Aggression Revisited: A Developmental Psychopathology Perspective.” I, for one, am really looking forward to hearing his talk.

Applications for the next Huesmann Early Career Award will be due October 1, 2025 (for individuals who received their terminal degree in 2015 or later).

I continue to work hard to improve our ISRA webpage ([link](#)). Everything is now updated except the “RESOURCES FOR COURSES ON AGGRESSION” in the membership section of the webpage. If you have any resources, please send them to me <bushman.20@osu.edu>. If you can think of other ways to improve our webpage, please let me know.

The ISRA conference in Munich, Germany, from July 29 to August 2, 2024 ([link](#)) is on my calendar! I hope it is on your calendar too. I look forward to seeing many of you there. Thank you for being a member of ISRA!

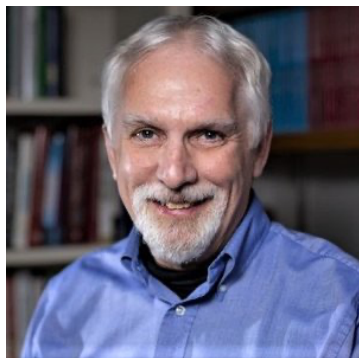

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Hello ISRA Friends and Colleagues,

As always, I hope you all are doing well. As usual, there is no earthshaking news to report about our journal *Aggressive Behavior* (AB). One thing to note is that beginning with the 2024 volume, AB will no longer be published in print form, although printed copies may be obtained through a print-on-demand service.

I'm happy to report that submissions of new manuscripts for 2023 continues the positive trend noted in my June *Bulletin* report. I expect that the final total will be close to 300, a 15%-20% increase over 2022, which had the most submissions in recent years. Most (or all) of the increase comes from an increasing diversity of authors/countries, on a broader range of aggression-related topics.

As many of you know, this is my last report to the *Bulletin* as the Editor-in-Chief of *Aggressive Behavior*. Professor Jane L. Ireland takes over as the new EIC in January. ISRA is very fortunate to be able to have someone as experienced and excellent as Jane taking over. Thanks, Jane!

I'd also like to thank those who have served as Associate Editors during my term as EIC: Chris Barlett, Alex Burt, Justin Carré, Sarah Coyne, Tom Denson, Ann Farrell, Jane Ireland, Barbara Krahé, and Tracy Vaillancourt. No EIC could have had a better group of colleagues handling the many manuscripts we've handled during my tenure. A special thanks to Mike Potegal, who has served as a sort of *de facto* Associate Editor on many animal and physiological aggression manuscripts during my term.

Of course, my editorial team and I thank the many Editorial Board members (i.e., Consulting Editors) and *ad hoc* reviewers, all of whom are so necessary to advancing our science through

the journal publication process. The high quality reviews provided by these many contributors are essential for any good journal and for advancing our science. Such selfless devotion to good science is an excellent sign for the future of ISRA and AB.

I've enjoyed serving as the EIC, especially the opportunities to help improve manuscripts, guide relatively new or inexperienced scholars in their research and manuscript preparation, and seeing the wide range of aggression-related research being done worldwide.

That's all, folks! I hope to see you at the ISRA meeting in Munich, Germany, July 29 to August 2, 2024.

Updates from the New Investigators Program

NI Co-Chairs: Tom Gumpel and Dominic Parrott



ISRA is soliciting applications for the 2024 New Investigators (NI) Program. The application deadline is March 15, 2024. More details are below and can be found on the [World Meeting website](#). We encourage all current graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, or junior faculty within three years of their terminal graduate degree to apply.

2024 New Investigators Program Call for Applications



ISRA began its NI Program (formally referred to as the Young Investigators Program) at the 2008 World Meeting in Budapest to encourage and assist new scholars who are getting started or are in the early stages of their aggression research careers. At the July 2024 meeting in Munich, Germany, the NI program will continue this tradition by focusing on supporting and facilitating the professional development of junior aggression scholars. The NI Program will include:

1. A Pre-Conference NI Workshop: The 2024 Workshop will bring NIs and group leaders together to engage in didactic and group activities designed to support and facilitate NIs' professional development and, ultimately, research-based career trajectories. Activities will include developing a research program, publishing in peer-reviewed journals, and being competitive in the job market. Activities will also seek to help NI's connect with senior scholars in the field.
2. Meet with mentors: NIs will meet with a different panel of senior mentors during lunch or dinner each day for informal discussions. Mentors may include plenary speakers who will be available for follow-up questions about their presentations.
3. Networking: NIs will meet with senior members of ISRA. They will also have opportunities to interact professionally and socially with other new investigators during and outside the pre-conference workshop. Mutual support and fruitful collaborations have developed out of past NI interactions.

4. Financial support: Awardees will receive partial monetary support to attend the 2024 ISRA World Meeting.
5. NIs participate in special events in the interim years between World Meetings.
 - a. NIs organize and present in a Virtual NI Meeting in which they present their research and academic progress.
 - b. NIs participate in the ISRA Speaker Series by organizing one speaker event each year.
 - c. NIs are eligible to participate in the *New Investigators Mentorship Program*, where they will collaborate with more senior ISRA researchers for a 2–4-week collaborative internship. ISRA will provide significant financial support for participating NIs.

NI PROGRAM APPLICATION: WHO AND HOW (Deadline March 15, 2024)

We encourage graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, and junior faculty within three years of their terminal graduate degree to apply. The NI Review Committee selects NI participants based on the originality and promise of their work in human or animal, observational, experimental, or theoretical analyses of aggression.

Please submit the following materials via email to NI Co-Chair Dominic Parrott at parrott@gsu.edu by March 15th, 2024.

1. The **abstract** of the scientific work you have submitted for presentation at the ISRA 2024 meeting.
 - a. *Note: You will submit this abstract twice: (1) A formal submission through the World Meeting submission portal (be sure to check the box to indicate that you wish to be considered for the NI Program, and (2) inclusion of this same abstract as part of your overall NI application materials submitted via email as indicated above.*
2. A standard **Curriculum Vitae**
3. A **250-word statement** summarizing your research interests and how participating in the NI Program would advance your professional development.
4. **Predoctoral students only**: Please include a letter from your advisor verifying your student status.

News About ISRA Members

Nikita Astaulov is a pharmacist who had to flee from Russia during the war on Ukraine. Nikita is currently in Kyrgyzstan Republic and looking for opportunities to continue PhD studies and do work dedicated to research in the field of aggression. Nikita graduated from the Peoples' Friendship University of Russia, one of the best medical universities in Russia, and has a background in aggression, neurobiology of decision-making and pharmaceuticals. Currently Nikita is writing scientific articles on the "Psychophysiology and Psychopharmacology of Aggression" topic. In these works, Nikita wrote about biochemical processes in the brain that lead to behavioral effects, the appearance of an increased level of aggression, antisocial personality disorder, experience of repeated aggression, and what drugs can be created to treat these diseases. Nikita is also volunteering in the criminal justice system and witnessing firsthand the importance of emotional support and human attitude towards prisoners. During their project, Nikita visited Russian jails and told stories and maintained communication with prisoners through letters. This experience has offered Nikita valuable insights into the challenges faced by those in the criminal justice system.

Mike Potegal has remained busy with research during retirement, particularly with projects which explore the continuities and discontinuities in the aggressive motivations and behavior of ourselves and other animals. We are happy to invite contributions to a forthcoming **Special Issue on the International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health (IJERPH) entitled "The Role of Digital Pro-social and Anti-social Experiences on the People Well-Being and Health"**.

Despite the advancement of digital media studies increasing, their application to improve peoples' well-being and health remains largely untapped, as World Health Organization pointed out. ISRA: an Interdisciplinary Society

ISRA, the International Society for Research on Aggression, founded in 1972, is an international interdisciplinary, organization dedicated to the study and dissemination of information on the causes and consequences of aggressive behavior and violence in all of its forms and contexts.

The Social Burden of Violence

The human capacity for aggressiveness and violence inflicts a considerable burden on society. Obviously, it can lead to death and immediate physical injury, but it also creates long-term physical and emotional disabilities. In addition, violence has a profound effect on those who witness it, such as the families and communities of the victims. Moreover, it impairs the ability of communities to address important public health issues, such as infectious diseases, malnutrition, urban decay, and environmental hazards. Violence and aggression often prevents the delivery of critical public services, such as emergency management and education. Such effects on society tend to exacerbate the very adverse social conditions that promote aggression, facilitating a vicious circle, with violence as a crucial factor.

From Understanding to Solutions

Finding solutions to the pervasive consequences of aggression, requires a multidisciplinary approach. To understand the complex causes, our research addresses brain and other physical processes that underlie the human capacity for violence and the psychological processes that facilitate violent actions. Strategies providing alternatives to violence are studied together with the social factors that serve to promote or prevent violent behavior. Importantly, students of aggression studies are increasingly moving beyond the simple awareness of new results in other disciplines, to develop important research approaches that span multiple disciplines. As a result, novel areas of synergy and convergence between different disciplines and methodologies emerge. *ISRA meetings* and media provide the forum and the multidisciplinary audience.

The ISRA Logo

The ISRA logo reflects our intention to advance the understanding of a deeply rooted behavior. The humanoid figure in the logo was modified from a petrograph called "the warrior" on the Minnesota-Ontario border¹⁾. The figure seems to express the ambivalent human attitude towards aggression. The figure faces us, a spear in its left hand, reflecting potential to kill. The tip of the spear points downwards, so the weapon is not about to be thrown. The right hand is up and open, a stop-signal in many cultures, and often a

signal of peaceful intent. The heart-shaped body expresses force and human's emotional nature.
