Dear ISRA Colleagues,

I will never forget my first ISRA World Meeting in 2008. I was a member of the first Young Investigator class and one of the few Assistant Professors in the group. Yet, I was still incredibly intimidated when I realized that the scholars whose work I had read over and over again for the past 10 years were in the same room as me at the Opening Reception. So my surprise and anxiety went through the roof when these same people, including Leonard

Berkowitz, Rowell Huesmann, Deborah Richardson, and Ken Leonard, naturally started "regular" conversations with me. Later in the week, I walked into a relative empty, but large, room to sit down and relax for a bit, and Eric Dubow went out of his way to walk through the line of chairs, sit down, and ask if I was enjoying the conference ("How did he know my name?" I asked myself).

But this is the spirit of ISRA. It is the development and fostering of professional and personal relationships that cross borders and oceans and last a lifetime. An update from the Editor in Chief of Aggressive Behavior

AGGRESSIVE BEHAVIOR

Hello ISRA Friends and Colleagues,

Here is a quick update on *Aggressive Behavior*. I'm in the process of producing a much more detailed report that will be presented at the ISRA World Meeting in Ottawa this coming July. For now, there are several items that you may find of interest.

Our new Brief Reports type of article seems to be doing well. I believe that this type will allow us publish more studies of importance to our

field. As projected in my December note, we had about the same number of submissions as in past years, 275 to be exact. We also handled 111 revisions. Many revised manuscripts required more than one revision, of course. We accepted 65 articles in 2021, for an overall acceptance rate of about 23%.

One of our Associate Editors—Professor S. Alexandra Burt—stepped down as an AE earlier this year because of other increasingly time-consuming commitments. On behalf of the Editorial team and all of ISRA, I thank Alex for her excellent service as an AE of the journal. Personally, I



greatly appreciate her advice on journal matters, her excellent work as an Associate Editor, and her many contributions to ISRA.

With the advice of the editorial team I asked Professor Barbara Krahé to step into the AE role. She graciously accepted the invitation and has been handling manuscripts for several months now. Most of you know Barbara from her many service roles for ISRA, prior ISRA meetings, her previous stint as an AE for our journal, and her incredible research record.

Our publisher, Wiley, announced that they have endorsed the <u>Declaration on Research</u> <u>Assessment (DORA)</u> for all of its journals. As I understand it, this is a movement to reduce excessive reliance on average journal citation impact scores in making hiring, promotion, and other decisions. What exactly this means for *Aggressive Behavior* isn't clear, but over the next year or so Wiley's goals are summarized by the following portion of an email that I received from them on April 22.

"By becoming a DORA signatory, we are formally committing to these five recommendations for publishers (edited for brevity, but you can read them in full here):

- 1. Greatly reduce emphasis on the journal impact factor as a promotional tool
- 2. Make available a range of article-level metrics
- 3. Encourage responsible authorship practices and highlight the specific contributions of each author
- 4. Remove all reuse limitations on reference lists in research articles
- 5. Remove or reduce the constraints on the number of references in research articles, and, where appropriate, mandate the citation of primary literature"

Finally, now that the Brief Reports article type is in place the AEs and I are considering increasing the page limits for regular Research Articles. The idea is that doing so may encourage more submissions of large scale research, including multi-study articles, large meta-analysis studies, and so on. We will keep you informed as our discussions progress.

That's all for now. I hope to see many of you in Ottawa in July!

News About ISRA Members

Christopher Barlett indicates that he is leaving his position in the psychology department at Gettysburg College for a position in the Department of Psychological Sciences at Kansas State University starting this month. His new email will be cpb6666@ksu.edu. With the new change, he reports that he can start mentoring graduate students. So, he will be accepting graduate students starting in the Fall 2023 school year.

Sheri Bauman is now officially Professor Emerita of Counseling in the College of Education at The University of Arizona. She plans to continue writing and research as well as attending international conferences.

Brad Bushman was selected as recipient of the 2022 Morton Deutsch Conflict Resolution Award of the Society for the Study of Peace, Conflict, and Violence: Division of Peace Psychology, American Psychological Association.

Douglas Gentile was named a "Distinguished Professor" in 2022, which is the highest academic honor at Iowa State University and recognizes "a faculty member whose accomplishments in research or creative activities have had a significant impact on their discipline nationally or internationally and who has demonstrated outstanding performance in at least one other area of faculty responsibility."

Jamie Ostrov will be funded by the NIH to conduct a new 5-year RCT using a teacher-coaching model of a social and emotional skills program for preschoolers that targets forms of aggression, peer victimization, and bullying that he and his colleagues developed. He will likely be hiring a post-doctoral fellow and several postbac staff as well as mentoring new PhD students in clinical psychology at the University at Buffalo, SUNY. Michael Potegal reports that he has officially retired from the University of Minnesota in January 2021, reports a paper in press in Psychological Reports describing a new approach to analyzing levels of aggression escalation in health care workplaces. Mike will be presenting his ideas about the phenomena and physiology of non-angry aggressive arousal in people and other



animals at the upcoming ISRA meeting in Ottawa. Among other projects, he has also begun an ethological/game theoretic inquiry into dyadic street fights depicted in online videos. As he says, "Retirement is relative!".



Irene Hanson Frieze has co-authored a new book entitled "Dynamics of Family and Intimate Partner Violence" published by Springer in 2020.



The book provides a research-based analysis of the dynamics of several types of violence in families and close relationships, as well as a discussion of theories relating to the experiences of victims. Drawing on recent research data and case studies, they examine causes, experiences, and interventions related to violence in various forms of relationships including children, siblings, older adults, and dating or married couples. The topics covered include:

- Causal factors in aggression and violence
- Theories of survivor coping and reactions to victimization
- Interventions for abused women and children
- Other forms of family violence: elder abuse, sibling abuse, and animal cruelty
- Societal responses to abuse in the family
- How such dynamics manifest in actual clinical cases

ISRA: an Interdisciplinary Society

ISRA, the International Society for Research on Aggression, founded in 1972, is an international interdisciplinary, organization dedicated to the study and dissemination of information on the causes and consequences of aggressive behavior and violence in all of its forms and contexts.

The Social Burden of Violence

The human capacity for aggressiveness and violence inflicts a considerable burden on society. Obviously, it can lead to death and immediate physical injury, but it also creates long-term physical and emotional disabilities. In addition, violence has a profound effect on those who witness it, such as the families and communities of the victims. Moreover, it impairs the ability of communities to address important public health issues, such as infectious diseases, malnutrition, urban decay, and environmental hazards. Violence and aggression often prevents the delivery of critical public services, such as emergency management and education. Such effects on society tend to exacerbate the very adverse social conditions that promote aggression, facilitating a vicious circle, with violence as a crucial factor.

ISRA's Core Mission

Effectively addressing violence and aggression, whether it be child abuse, domestic violence, homicide, terrorism, sexual violence, or civil wars, requires a sustained focus by international scientists. *ISRA's principal mission* since 1972 is to show that aggression and violence, as well as alternative ways to resolve conflicts, can be successfully studied using scientific methods.

Members, Meetings and Media

- *ISRA* members gather for *World Meetings* every other year on alternating continents.
- All members receive a complimentary electronic subscription to *Aggressive Behavior*, the official journal of ISRA.

From Understanding to Solutions

Finding solutions to the pervasive consequences of aggression, requires a multidisciplinary approach. To understand the complex causes, our research addresses brain and other physical processes that underlie the human capacity for violence and the psychological processes that facilitate violent actions. Strategies providing alternatives to violence are studied together with the social factors that serve to promote or prevent violent behavior. Importantly, students of aggression studies are increasingly moving beyond the simple awareness of new results in other disciplines, to develop important research approaches that span multiple disciplines. As a result, novel areas of synergy and convergence between different disciplines and methodologies emerge. **ISRA** meetings and media provide the forum and the multidisciplinary audience.

The ISRA Logo

The ISRA logo reflects our intention to advance the understanding of a deeply rooted behavior. The humanoid figure in the logo was modified from a petrograph called "the warrior" on the Minnesota-Ontario border¹⁾. The figure seems to express the ambivalent human attitude towards aggression. The figure faces us, a spear in its left hand, reflecting potential to kill. The tip of the spear points downwards, so the weapon is not about to be thrown. The right hand is up and open, a stop-signal in many cultures, and often a

signal of peaceful intent. The heart-shaped body expresses force and human's emotional nature.
